

## **Distribution Policy**





#### **Performance Review**

This Annual Report covers the twelve-month financial year from 1 December 2022 to 30 November 2023.

For Hong Leong SEA-5 Equity Fund Class A, the Fund posted a return of -2.81% (based on NAV Per Unit-to-NAV Per Unit basis with gross income (if any) from the Fund reinvested) in the past twelve months while its benchmark the FTSE/ASEAN 40 Index has registered a return of -0.12% (in Malaysian Ringgit terms). For the five financial years ended 30 November 2023, the Fund has posted a return of 16.46% while its benchmark has registered a return of 4.47% while distributing a total gross income of 7.0000 sen per unit (net income of 6.8850 sen per unit).

For Hong Leong SEA-5 Equity Fund Class B, the Fund posted a return of -2.08% (based on NAV Per Unit-to-NAV Per Unit basis with gross income (if any) from the Fund reinvested) since 27 February 2023 while its benchmark the FTSE/ASEAN 40 Index has registered a return of 1.12% (in Malaysian Ringgit terms).

Chart 2: Asset Allocation - December 2022 to November 2023




Chart 3: Sector Allocation as at 30 November 2023





Chart 4: Geographical Allocation as at 30 November 2023



# Strategies employed by the Fund during the period under review

We locked in our gains in Malaysia companies and allocated the proceeds to Thailand and Indonesia's companies. Indonesia consumer sector is one of the outperforming sectors as the strong growth in its mid-high tier consumer spending recovery.

## An explanation on the differences in portfolio composition

During the financial year under review, we increased our positions in Indonesia and Thailand markets as the reopening of their economies will see higher rebounds in their Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growth. We have relocated into including hospitality, airports and consumer related sectors

## Operational review of the Fund

For the financial year under review, there were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Fund or circumstances that would materially affect the interest of Unit holders up to the date of this Manager's report.

#### IV. MARKET REVIEW

During the financial year under review, ASEAN markets experienced downward pressure following a robust performance in 2022. This downward pressure was primarily attributed to capital outflows from ASEAN markets and a shift of focus towards Greater China markets. Investors anticipated a strong economic recovery in China following its reopening in 2023, leading to a redirection of investments. In terms of inflation, most ASEAN regions observed a cooling off of inflationary pressures. This trend alleviated concerns about rising prices in the region. Additionally, consumer spending exhibited resilience and supported the growth for 2023.

In the broader economic context, the United States (US) exhibited robust performance during this period. July's labour market statistics indicated resilience, with payroll job gains slightly below projections at 187,000. Despite this, the unemployment rate decreased to 3.5%, and average

hourly earnings showed a year-on-year (YoY) increase of 4.4%. July also saw a noteworthy 0.7% month-on-month (MoM) increase in retail sales, surpassing the anticipated rise. However, signs of a cooling US economy emerged in subsequent months, including modest increases in jobless claims, rising credit card delinquencies, and a slight fall in October retail spending.

Singapore's GDP showed stronger-than-expected growth in the third quarter, with advance estimates indicating a 1% quarter-on-quarter (QoQ) expansion and a 0.7% YoY increase. This performance marked the second consecutive quarter of growth acceleration and surpassed earlier expectations, building on the momentum from the previous quarter where growth was at 0.1% QoQ and 0.5% YoY. The resurgence in manufacturing, particularly in electronics, emerged as the primary driver behind the growth rebound. Manufacturing growth recovered after two consecutive negative quarters, increasing from -1.9% to 0.2% QoQ. On the other hand, construction growth fell from 2.7% to 0.6%, and services experienced a decline from 1% to 0.7%.

Indonesia's real GDP growth for the third quarter of 2023 disappointed, slipping to 4.9% YoY from 5.2% in the second quarter. This deceleration in growth was primarily driven by a slowdown in private consumption, further compounded by a contraction in government consumption. However, net exports provided a positive offset to this decline. Consequently, the slower growth in the third quarter has led to a revision in the 2023 GDP estimate, now lowered to 5% from the previous forecast of 5.1%.

The slowdown in the third quarter GDP growth is expected to deter Bank Indonesia from implementing further rate rises. Subdued the Consumer Price Index (CPI) inflation, recorded at 2.6% in October and 2.9% for the third quarter of 2023, is reinforced by the negative GDP deflator at -0.4% YoY. This negative deflator reflects the sharp decline in commodity export prices.

The release of Thailand's third quarter of 2023 GDP data indicates a significant slowdown in growth, falling to 1.5% YoY from the already modest 1.8% in the second

quarter of 2023. Despite the overall economic slowdown, net exports made a substantial positive contribution to the third quarter of 2023 GDP growth. This is noteworthy given that export growth slowed to a marginal 0.2% YoY, down from 0.6% in the second quarter of 2023. The positive impact was achieved through a significant 10.2% YoY contraction in imports, contrasting with the -2.3% in the second quarter of 2023. However, the recovery in the tourism sector has been disappointingly gradual. Arrivals in the first nine months of the year only reached 68% of the pre-pandemic 2019 level. This is primarily attributed to the absence of Chinese arrivals, which were only 29% of the 2019 level.

The Philippines witnessed a rapid decline in inflation, registering at 4.1% YoY in November, marking a substantial 2-percentage point drop from September. Core inflation has consistently fallen for the eighth consecutive month, reaching 4.7% YoY. This downward trajectory is expected to continue, reaching around 3% in early 2024. The primary driver of the inflation decline was the sharp reduction in fuel prices, causing the transport index to turn negative YoY over the past two months. Additionally, food inflation has moderated to 5.7% YoY in November from 9.7% in September.

In the third quarter, Malaysia's GDP growth stood at 3.3% YoY, a slight increase from the 2.9% reported in the second quarter, consistent with the advance estimate. The breakdown by expenditure confirmed that robust domestic demand remained the primary driver of growth. Private consumption rose by 4.6% YoY, a slight improvement from the 4.3% in the second quarter, while government spending increased by 5.8% YoY, up from 3.8% in the previous quarter. However, net exports had a negative impact on growth, dragging real GDP down by 1.4 percentage points. Encouragingly, investment growth was sustained in the third quarter. Fixed asset investment saw acceleration, reaching 1.9% QoQ or 5.1% YoY, compared to 1.5% QoQ and 5.5% YoY in the second quarter. Although there was slower growth in machine and equipment investment, this was offset by higher growth in structures investment, driven by the implementation of infrastructure projects.

#### V. FUTURE PROSPECTS AND PROPOSED STRATEGIES

In the upcoming year, our outlook on ASEAN markets turns more optimistic, primarily driven by the anticipated downward trajectory of US interest rates. This shift is expected to alleviate pressure on exchange rates and mitigate importing inflation costs, fostering positive conditions for domestic private consumption.

As part of our strategic approach, we are strategically locking in gains from Singapore banks and reallocating resources to the selective Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs) sector. This shift is motivated by the REITs sector's potential for higher dividend yields. We anticipate that yield compression will materialize once the Fed initiates interest rate cuts in 2024

This proactive strategy aims to capitalize on the evolving market dynamics, positioning our portfolio to benefit from the changing interest rate environment. As we navigate the uncertainties of the financial landscape, our focus remains on optimizing returns while adapting to the shifting economic conditions.

#### VI. SOFT COMMISSIONS

The Manager has received soft commissions from brokers/ dealers in the form of goods and services such as research materials, data and quotation services incidental to investment management of the Fund and investment related publications. Such soft commissions received are utilised in the investment management of the Fund and are of demonstrable benefit to the Fund and Unit holders and there was no churning of trades.

#### VII. SECURITIES LENDING OR REPURCHASE TRANSACTIONS

No securities lending or repurchase transactions have been carried out during the financial year under review.

#### VIII. CROSS TRADE TRANSACTIONS

No cross trade transactions have been carried out during the financial year under review.

#### REPORT ON THE AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS.

### Our opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements of Hong Leong SEA-5 Equity Fund ("the Fund") give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Fund as at 30 November 2023 and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the financial year then ended in accordance with Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards and International Financial Reporting Standards.

## What we have audited

We have audited the financial statements of the Fund, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 November 2023, and the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in net assets attributable to unit holders and statement of cash flows for the financial year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, as set out on pages 18 to 59.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 30 NOVEMBER 2023

# 1. THE FUND, THE MANAGER AND THEIR PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

Hong Leong SEA-5 Equity Fund ("the Fund") was constituted pursuant to the execution of a Deed dated 6 December 2016, First Supplemental Deed dated 18 June 2021, Second Supplemental Deed dated 9 September 2021 and Third Supplemental Deed dated 26 May 2022 between the Manager, Hong Leong Asset Management Bhd and Maybank Trustees Berhad ("the Trustee") for the unit holders of the Fund.

The Fund aims to achieve medium to long-term capital growth by investing in a portfolio of investments in 5 South-East Asia markets, namely Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia, Thailand and Philippines.

The Fund will invest in a diversified portfolio of equities comprising blue chip stocks and index stocks listed in the 5 South-East Asia markets, namely Malaysia, Singapore, Indonesia, Thailand and Philippines. The Fund commenced operations on 9 January 2017 and will continue its operations until terminated as provided under Part 12 of the Deed.

The Manager of the Fund is Hong Leong Asset Management Bhd, a company incorporated in Malaysia. The principal activity of the Manager is the management of unit trust funds, private retirement schemes and private investment mandates. Its holding company is Hong Leong Capital Berhad, a company incorporated in Malaysia and listed on the Main Market of Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad.

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the Manager on 22 January 2024.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the financial statements:

## (a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards ("MFRS") and International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS").

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of financial assets and financial liabilities (including derivative financial instruments) at fair value through profit or loss.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MFRS and IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reported financial year. It also requires the Manager to exercise their judgment in the process of applying the Fund's accounting policies. The Manager believes that the underlying assumptions are appropriate and the Fund's financial statements therefore present the financial position results fairly. Although these estimates and judgment are based on the Manager's best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may differ.

The areas involving a higher degree of judgment or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in Note 2(m).

(i) Amendments to published standard and interpretations that are relevant and effective 1 December 2022

There are no standards, amendments to standards or interpretations that are effective for annual periods beginning on 1 December 2022 that have a material effect on the financial statemens of the Fund.

(ii) New standards, amendment and interpretations effective after 1 December 2022 and have not been early adopted

A number of new standards, amendments to standards and interpretations are effective for annual periods beginning after 1 December 2022. None of these are expected to have a material effect on the financial statements of the Fund, except the following set out below:

 Amendments to MFRS 101 'Classification of liabilities as current or non-current' clarify that liabilities are classified as either current or noncurrent, depending on the rights that exist at the end of the reporting period. Classification is unaffected by the entity's expectations or events after the reporting date (e.g. the receipt of a waiver or a breach of covenant).

The amendment is effective for the annual financial reporting period beginning on or after 1 December 2024

The amendment shall be applied retrospectively.

## (b) Financial assets and financial liabilities

#### Classification

The Fund classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value (either through other comprehensive income ('OCI') or through profit or loss), and
- · those to be measured at amortised cost.

The Fund classifies its investments based on both the Fund's business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flows characteristics of the financial assets. The portfolio of financial assets is managed and performance is evaluated on a fair value basis. The Fund is primarily focused on fair value information and uses that information to assess the assets' performance and to make decisions. The Fund has not taken the option to irrevocably designate any equity securities as fair value through other comprehensive income. The contractual cash flows of the Fund's debt securities are solely principal and interest, however, these securities are neither held for the purpose of collecting contractual cash flows nor held both for collecting contractual cash flows and for sale. The collection of contractual cash flows is only incidental to achieving the Fund's business model's objective. Consequently, all investments are measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Fund classifies cash and cash equivalents and dividends receivable as financial assets measured at amortised cost as these financial assets are held to collect contractual cash flows consisting of the amount outstanding.

The Fund classifies amount due to the Manager, amount due to the Trustee and other payables and accruals as financial liabilities measured at amortised cost.

## Recognition and measurement

Regular purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade-date – the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset. Investments are initially recognised at fair value. Transaction costs are expensed in the statement of comprehensive income.

Financial liabilities, within the scope of MFRS 9, are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the investments have expired or have been transferred and the Fund has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when it is extinguished, i.e. when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged or cancelled or expired.

Unrealised gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of the financial assets at fair value through profit or loss including the effects of currency translation are presented in the statement of comprehensive income within net gain or loss on financial assets at fair value through profit or loss in the year which they arise.

Dividend income from financial assets at fair value through profit or loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as part of dividend income when the Fund's right to receive payments is established.

Local quoted investments are valued at the last traded market prices quoted on Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad ("Bursa Securities") at the date of the statement of financial position.

Foreign quoted investments are valued at the last traded market prices quoted on the respective foreign stock exchanges at the close of the business day of the respective foreign stock exchanges.

If a valuation based on the market price does not represent the fair value of the quoted investments, for example during abnormal market conditions or when no market price is available, including in the event of a suspension in the quotation of the quoted securities for a period exceeding 14 days, or such shorter period as agreed by the Trustee, then the quoted securities are valued as determined in good faith by the Manager, based on the methods or bases approved by the Trustee after appropriate technical consultation

Deposits with licensed financial institutions are stated at cost plus accrued interest calculated on the effective interest rate method over the period from the date of placement to the date of maturity of the respective deposits, which is a close estimate of their fair value due to the short term nature of the deposits. Financial assets at amortised cost and other financial liabilities are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

### **Impairment**

The Fund measures credit risk and expected credit losses using probability of default, exposure at default and loss given default. Management considers both historical analysis and forward looking information in determining any expected credit loss. Management considers the probability of default to be closed to zero as these instruments have a low risk of default and the counterparties have a strong capacity to meet their contractual obligations in the near term. As a result, no loss allowance has been recognised based on 12-month expected credit losses as any such impairment would be wholly insignificant to the Fund.

## Significant increase in credit risk

A significant increase in credit risk is defined by management as any contractual payment which is more than 30 days past due.

# <u>Definition of default and credit-impaired financial</u> assets

Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit impaired.

#### Write-off

The Fund writes off financial assets, in whole or in part, when it has exhausted all practical recovery efforts and has concluded there is no reasonable expectation of recovery. The assessment of no reasonable expectation of recovery is based on unavailability of obligor's sources of income or assets to generate sufficient future cash flows to pay the amount. The Fund may write-off financial assets that are still subject to enforcement activity. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off will result in impairment gains. There are no write-offs/ recoveries during the financial year.

# (c) Foreign currency

# Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the Fund are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates (the "functional currency"). The financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia ("RM"), which is the Fund's functional and presentation currency.

Due to mixed factors in determining the functional currency of the Fund, the Manager has used its judgment to determine the functional currency that most faithfully represents the economic effects of the underlying transactions, events and conditions and

have determined the functional currency to be in RM primarily due to the following factors:

- The Fund's NAV per unit and the settlement of creation and cancellation are denominated in RM.
- The Fund's significant expenses are denominated in RM

#### Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where items are remeasured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in profit or loss, except when deferred in other comprehensive income as qualifying cash flow hedges.

Translation differences on non-monetary financial assets and liabilities such as equities and collective investment schemes held at fair value through profit or loss are recognised in profit or loss as part of the fair value gain or loss.

# (d) Income recognition

Dividend income is recognised on the ex-dividend date when the Fund's right to receive payment is established.

Interest income from deposits with licensed financial institutions and auto-sweep facility bank account are recognised on the effective interest rate method on an accrual basis.

Interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset except for financial assets that subsequently become credit-impaired. For credit-impaired financial assets, the effective interest rate

is applied to the net carrying amount of the financial asset (after deduction of the loss allowance).

Realised gain or loss on disposal of quoted investments is accounted for as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of quoted investments, determined on a weighted average cost basis.

Realised gain or loss on derivatives - unquoted forward currency contracts is measured by the net settlement as per the forward currency contracts.

## (e) Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at banks and deposits held in highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with an original maturity of three months or lesser which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

## (f) Amount due from/to brokers/dealers

Amount due from/to brokers/dealers represents receivables/payables for investments sold/purchased that have been contracted for but not yet settled or delivered on the statement of financial position date respectively.

These amounts are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, less provision for impairment for amount due from brokers/dealers. A provision for impairment of amount due from a broker/dealer is established when there is objective evidence that the Fund will not be able to collect all amounts due from the relevant broker/dealer. Significant financial difficulties of the broker/dealer, probability that the broker/dealer will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation, and default in payments are considered indicators that the amount due from brokers/dealers is impaired. Once a financial asset or a group of similar financial assets

has been written down as a result of an impairment loss, interest income is recognised using the rate of interest used to discount the future cash flows for the purpose of measuring the impairment loss.

## (g) Taxation

Current tax expense is determined according to Malaysian tax laws at the prevailing tax rate based on the taxable profit earned during the financial year. Withholding taxes on investment income from foreign investments are based on the tax regime of the respective countries that the Fund invests in. Such withholding taxes are not "income tax" in nature and are recognised and measured based on the requirements of MFRS 137. They are presented within other expenses line in the statement of comprehensive income.

## (h) Unit holders' capital

Prior to 27 February 2023, the Fund classified its puttable instruments as equity in accordance with MFRS 132 (Amendment) "Financial Instruments: Presentation". However, the amendment requires puttable financial instruments that meet the definition of equity to be classified as financial liability when certain strict criteria are not met. Those criteria include:

- the puttable instrument must entitle the unit holder to a pro-rate share of net assets;
- the puttable instrument must be the most subordinated class and class features must be identical.
- there must be no contractual obligations to deliver cash or another financial assets other than the obligation on the issuer to repurchase; and
- the total expected cash flows from the puttable instrument over its life must be based substantially on the profit or loss of the issuer.

These conditions were not met when Class A and Class B were issued on 27 February 2023 as Class A and Class B do not have identical features.

The Fund issues cancellable units, in two classes of units, known respectively as the Class A and Class B which are cancelled at the unit holder's option, and do not have identical features. The units are classified as financial liabilities. Cancellable units can be put back to the Fund at any time for cash equal to a proportionate share of the Fund's net asset value of respective classes. The outstanding units are carried at the redemption amount that is payable at the date of the statement of financial position if the unit holders exercises the right to put back the unit to the Fund.

Units are created and cancelled at prices based on the Fund's net asset value per unit of respective classes at the time of creation and cancellation. The Fund's net asset value per unit is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to unit holders of respective classes with the total number of outstanding units of respective classes.

### (i) Increase/decrease in net assets attributable to unit holders

Income not distributed is included in net assets attributable to unit holders. Movements in net assets attributable to unit holders are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as finance costs.

## (j) Finance cost

A distribution to the Fund's unit holders is accounted for as a deduction from realised reserve. As a result of the reclassification of units from equity to financial liability, the Fund's distributions are no longer classified as dividend paid in the statement of changes in net assets attributable to unit holders, but rather as finance cost in the statement of comprehensive income.

A proposed distribution is recognised as a financial liability in the year in which it is approved.

## (k) Transaction costs

Transaction costs are costs incurred to acquire or dispose financial assets or liabilities at fair value through profit or loss. They include fees and commissions paid to agents and brokers/dealers. Transaction costs, when incurred, are immediately recognised in the statement of comprehensive income as expenses.

## (I) Derivatives

A derivative is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset/liability of the Fund and a financial liability/ asset or equity instrument of another enterprise.

A financial asset is any asset that is cash, a contractual right to receive cash or another financial asset from another enterprise, a contractual right to exchange financial instruments with another enterprise under conditions that are potentially favorable, or an equity instrument of another enterprise.

A financial liability is any liability that is a contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial asset to another enterprise, or to exchange financial instruments with another enterprise under conditions that are potentially unfavorable.

The Fund's derivatives comprise unquoted forward currency contracts. Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value on the date a derivative contract is entered into and is subsequently re-measured at their fair value.

The fair value of forward foreign currency contracts is determined using forward exchange rates at the date of statement of financial position with the resulting value discounted back to present value.

The method of recognising the resulting gain or loss depends on whether the derivative is designated as a hedging instrument, and the nature of the item being hedged. Derivatives that do not qualify for hedge accounting are classified as held for trading and accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy set out in Note 2(b).

# (m) Critical accounting estimates and judgments in applying accounting policies

The Fund makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, rarely equal the related actual results. To enhance the information content of the estimates, certain key variables that are anticipated to have material impact to the Fund's results and financial position are tested for sensitivity to changes in the underlying parameters.

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated by the Manager and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

In undertaking any of the Fund's investment, the Manager will ensure that all assets of the Fund under management will be valued appropriately, that is at fair value and in compliance with the Securities Commission Malaysia's Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds.

However, the Manager is of the opinion that there are no accounting policies which require significant judgment to be exercised.

# 3. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS, RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

The Fund is exposed to a variety of risks which include market risk (inclusive of price risk, interest rate risk and currency risk), credit risk, liquidity risk and capital risk.

Financial risk management is carried out through internal control process adopted by the Manager and adherence to the investment restrictions as stipulated in the prospectus.

### (a) Market risk

### (i) Price risk

Price risk arises mainly from the uncertainty about future prices of investments. It represents the potential loss the Fund might suffer through holding market positions in the face of price movements. The Manager manages the risk of unfavourable changes in prices by continuous monitoring of the performance and risk profile of the investment portfolio.

The price risk is managed through diversification and selection of securities and other financial instruments within specified limits according to the Deed.

### (ii) Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of the Fund's investments and its return will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates.

Interest rate is a general economic indicator that will have an impact on the management of the Fund. The Fund's exposure to the interest rate risk is mainly confined to short term placements with licensed financial institutions. The Manager overcomes the exposure by way of maintaining deposits on a short term basis.

As at end of each reporting year, the Fund does not hold any deposits and is not exposed to a material level of interest rate risk.

# (iii) Currency risk

Currency risk is associated with investments that are quoted and/or priced in foreign currency denomination. Malavsian based should be aware that if the Malaysian Ringgit appreciates against the currencies in which the financial assets are denominated, this will have an adverse effect on the net asset value of the Fund and vice versa. Investors should also note any gains or losses arising from the movement of foreign currencies against its functional currency may therefore increase/decrease the capital gains of the investment denominated in foreign currencies. Nevertheless, investors should realise that currency risk is considered as one of the major risks to investments in foreign assets due to the volatile nature of the foreign exchange market. The Manager or its fund management delegate could utilise two pronged approaches in order to mitigate the currency risk; firstly by spreading the investments across different currencies (i.e. diversification) and secondly, by hedging the currencies when it is deemed necessary.

# (b) Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that an issuer or counterparty will default on its contractual obligation resulting in financial loss to the Fund.

The credit risk arising from placements of deposits with licensed financial institutions is managed by ensuring that the Fund will only place deposits in reputable licensed financial institutions.

For amount due from brokers/dealers, the settlement terms are governed by the relevant rules and regulations as prescribed by Bursa Securities and respective foreign stock exchanges. The credit/default risk is minimal as all transactions in quoted investments are settled/paid upon delivery using approved brokers/dealers.

# (c) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that investments cannot be readily sold at or near its actual value without taking a significant discount. This will result in lower net asset value of the Fund.

The Manager manages this risk by maintaining sufficient level of liquid assets to meet anticipated payments and cancellations of the units by unit holders. Liquid assets comprise cash at banks, deposits with licensed financial institutions and other instruments.

The table below summarises the Fund's financial liabilities into relevant maturity groupings based on the remaining period as at the end of each reporting year to the contractual maturity date. The amounts in the table are the contractual undiscounted cash flows.

# (d) Capital risk

The capital of the Fund is represented by the net assets attributable to the unit holders. The amount of net assets attributable to unit holders can change significantly on a daily basis as the Fund is subject to daily subscriptions and redemptions at the discretion of unit holders. The Fund's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns for unit holders' and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain a strong capital base to support the development of the investment activities of the Fund.

# (e) Fair value estimation

Financial instruments comprise financial assets and financial liabilities. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The information presented herein represents the estimates of fair values as at the date of the statement of financial position.

The Fund's financial assets and financial liabilities are measured on an ongoing basis at either fair value or at amortised cost based on the respective classification.

The fair value of financial assets traded in active market (such as publicly traded derivatives and trading securities) are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the reporting date. The Fund utilises the last traded market price for financial assets where the last traded price falls within the bidask spread. In circumstances where the last traded price is not within the bid-ask spread, the Manager will determine the point within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of the fair value.

A financial instrument is regarded as quoted in an active market if quoted prices are readily and regularly available from an exchange, dealer, broker, industry group, pricing service, or regulatory agency, and those

prices represent actual and regularly occurring market transactions on an arm's length basis.

The fair value of financial assets that are not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques. The Fund uses a variety of methods and makes assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each period end date. Valuation techniques used for non-standardised financial instruments such as options, currency swaps and other over-the-counter derivatives, include the use of comparable recent arm's length transactions, reference to other instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, option pricing models and other valuation techniques commonly used by market participants making the maximum use of market inputs and relying as little as possible on entity-specific inputs.

For instruments for which there is no active market, the Fund may use internally developed models, which are usually based on valuation methods and techniques generally recognised as standard within the industry. Valuation models are used primarily to value unlisted equity, debt securities and other debt instruments for which market were or have been inactive during the financial year. Some of the inputs to these models may not be market observable and are therefore estimated based on assumptions.

The output of a model is always an estimate or approximation of a value that cannot be determined with certainty, and valuation techniques employed may not fully reflect all factors relevant to the positions the Fund holds. Valuations are therefore adjusted, where appropriate, to allow for additional factors including model risk, liquidity risk and counter party risk.

An active market is a market in which transactions for the asset or liability take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an on-going basis.

# (i) Fair value hierarchy

The table below analyses financial instruments carried at fair value. The different levels have been defined as follows:

- Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active market for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1);
- Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices) (Level 2); and
- Inputs for the asset and liability that are not based on observable market data (that is, unobservable inputs) (Level 3).

The level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement is categorised in its entirely is determined on the basis of the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirely. For this purpose, the significance of an input is assessed against the fair value measurement in its entirely. If a fair value measurement uses observable inputs that requires significant adjustment based on unobservable inputs, that measurement is a Level 3 measurement. Assessing the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirely requires judgment, considering factors specific to the asset or liability.

The determination of what constitutes 'observable' requires significant judgment by the Fund. The Fund considers observable data to be that market data that is readily available, regularly distributed or updated, reliable and verifiable, not proprietary and provided by independent sources that are actively involved in the relevant market.

transfer restrictions, valuations may be adjusted to reflect illiquidity and/or non-transferability, which are generally based on available market information. The Fund's policies on valuation of these financial assets are stated in Note 2(b) and 2(l).

(ii) The carrying values of financial assets (other than financial assets at FVTPL and derivatives) and financial liabilities (other than derivatives) are a reasonable approximation of their fair values due to their short term nature.

### 4. MANAGEMENT FEE

In accordance with Division 13.1 of the Deed, the Manager is entitled to a management fee of up to 1.80% per annum calculated daily based on the net asset value of the Fund.

For the financial year ended 30 November 2023, the management fee is recognised at a rate of 1.80% from 1 December 2022 to 26 February 2023. With effect from 27 February 2023, the management fee are recognised at a rate of 1.80% for both Class A and Class B. The management fee was recognised at a rate of 1.80% per annum for the financial year ended 30 November 2022.

There is no further liability to the Manager in respect of management fee other than the amount recognised above.

#### 5. TRUSTEE'S FEE

In accordance with Division 13.2 of the Deed, the Trustee is entitled to a fee not exceeding 0.08% subject to a minimum of RM9,000 (excluding custodian fee and charges) per annum calculated daily based on the net asset value of the Fund.

For the financial year ended 30 November 2023, the Trustee's fee is recognised at a rate of 0.035% (2022: 0.035%) per annum. The Fund recognised the Trustee's fee at RM9,000 based on terms agreed with the Trustee for the financial year ended 30 November 2023 and 30 November 2022.

There is no further liability to the Trustee in respect of Trustee's fee other than the amount recognised above.
